## Amendments to the By-Laws of the Alumnae Association of Wilson College

#### DISCUSSION

The Board of Directors of the Alumnae Association of Wilson College (AAWC) proposes making three substantive amendments to the By-Laws of the AAWC.

At its meeting in October 2019, the Board of Trustees of Wilson College amended their By-Laws to create a single tier of Trustees, eliminating the position of Alumnae Trustee, and adopting a commitment that at least 30% of the members of the Board of Trustees will be graduates of Wilson College. As the Board of Trustees no longer recognizes the position of Alumnae Trustee, we propose eliminating that position from our By-Laws.

The College also now handles its employment activities in a centralized manner. Our current By-Laws reflect a level of involvement of the President of the AAWC in the College's employment of the Director of Alumni Relations that has not existed for some time, and we propose changing the language in the part of our By-Laws that described the hiring and employment of the DAR to reflect that the President and Board of AAWC provides input but are not directly involved in the Human Resources administration matters pertaining to the DAR.

Finally, we believe it is appropriate to integrate the Nominating Committee into the Board of Directors as one of its standing committees. Currently, the Nominating Committee exists as a committee separate from the Board of Directors, with only its Chair sitting on the Board as a non-voting member. In addition to the Chair, two members of the Nominating Committee are elected by the AAWC membership, just as we elect Directors, and two members of the Board are assigned to be members of the Nominating Committee. We have largely ignored that very separate structure for some time now, welcoming all members of the Committee on the Board, and assigning the elected members of the Nominating Committee to serve on other Board committees. We believe that we need a fully engaged and integrated Nominating Committee to best represent and serve the AAWC and thus propose making the Committee and its members part of the structure of the Board itself.

The transition from our current approach to the ones we propose to our membership at this time will be handled administratively, as only six members of the Association are impacted by the changes. Those members of the AAWC who have been elected to serve as either the Chair of the Nominating Committee or its members, as well as those who have been elected to serve as Alumnae Trustees, will now be recognized as Directors of

the AAWC. We will continue to maintain in our records of past service to the AAWC the roles that alumnae actually held.

In addition to these three changes, there are several places where the nomenclature used by the College has changed and we propose bringing the language that pertains to College titles, buildings, etc. into line with the actual titles, as well as places where actual process has evolved differently over time than is now in the by-laws. As we propose individual substantive changes, we also provide for some edits that are necessary to address any grammatic and/or punctuation changes that flow from the changes.

Article II, Section 2.1.d.: Change "Director of Alumnae/i Relations" to "Director of Alumni Relations"

Article III, Section 3.1, third sentence: Strike "and Nominating Committee members"

Article III, Section 3.2, first sentence: Strike "three (3) representatives of the Association who serve on the Board of Trustees (hereinafter referred to as "Alumnae Trustees")"

Article III, Section 3.2, second sentence: Strike "and the chair of the Nominating Committee". Change "as non-voting members" to "as a non-voting member"

Article III, Section 3.3.a: Strike "and Nominating Committee" and "or Nominating Committee"

Article III, Section 3.3.e: Strike "or Nominating Committee" and "or the Nominating Committee"

Article III, Section 3.4: Strike "Nominating Committee"

Article III, Section 3.5.b: Strike "or Nominating Committee" and "or the Nominating Committee"

Article III, Section 3.9.a(2) and (3): Strike. Change "(4)" to "(2)"

Article III, Section 3.9.b: Insert after *Wilson Magazine* "(or some other mailing from the College)". Change "RO" to "ARO"

Article III, Section 3.9.d: Strike ", the Directors" and replace with "and Directors", and strike "the Alumnae Trustee and the member of the Nominating Committee"

Article III, Section 10, fourth sentence: Strike.

Article III, Section 3.11, first sentence: Replace the comma between "Director" and

"Officer" with "or" and strike "or Alumnae Trustee"

Section IV, Section 4.3.a: Strike "shall appoint two members to the Nominating Committee with the approval of the Board;" Strike "except the Nominating Committee"

Article V: Strike.

Article VI, Sections 6.1.a, b and c: Strike. Section 6.1.d. becomes Section 6.1

Article VI, Section 6.2.a: Insert "and" after "Secretary" and delete ",", and strike: "and the Alumnae Trustees"

Article VI, Section 6.3, second sentence: Add "/his" after "her"

Article VII, Section 7.4.a: Strike "The DAR shall deposit" and capitalize the "A" in "All"

Article VII, Section 7.4.a: Insert "shall be deposited in a timely manner and an accurate record kept thereof." after "Association"

Article VII, Section 7.4.a: Strike "and keep a record thereof."

Article VII, Section 7.4.b: Strike "DAR and the"

Article VIII, Section 8.2: Strike "Duties of the Position" and replace with "Association Expectations of the DAR"

Article VIII, Section 8.3: Strike all after "office of the DAR" and insert "the President and members of the Board invited by the President shall provide input to the Vice President for Institutional Advancement on the selection of an individual to fill that role."

During Reunion 2020, the Alumnae Association will once again sponsor a roundrobin raffle to raise funds for the association.


